Revamped Policy on Multiculturalism

Victorian Government launched the latest policy on Multiculturalism- Victoria's advantage - Unity, Diversity and Opportunity. The new and improved policy builds upon the principles and values of multiculturalism and citizenship enshrined in the Multicultural Victoria Act 2011.

The most important feature of the new policy is that it contains a set of indicators which will monitor how Victoria is faring in the support of multiculturalism, citizenship and social cohesion. Collecting and reporting on indicator data will assist government and communities to better identify trends and emerging issues. The newly introduced policy has also adopted the whole-of-government rather than single agency approaches which can have a greater

impact on achieving policy goals.

Multiculturalism has been a contested policy and concept since its introduction in Australia in the 1970s. While maintaining some core principles, in the four decades since its introduction, the federal multicultural policies have evolved in response to changing government priorities and responses to the challenges facing Australian migrant communities.

Today all Australian States and Territories have active policies and programs dealing with multiculturalism. Leading the way is Victoria with the reputation of being the most diverse and multicultural state not only in Australia but in the world. With twenty six percent Victorian born overseas and almost forty six percent at least one of the parent born overseas, the state has identified the need to keep updated with the

policy to tackle the issues associated with ethnic diversity. The new policy comes as a step to harness the benefit of that diversity.

From Nepalese community perspective the timing for the new policy could not have been better. The period between 2006 and 2011 Victoria saw the fastest rates of growth in new migrants over the past two decades and that's exactly the time majority of Nepalese had arrived in Australia and the trend continues on. For that very reason, the indicators presented in the new policy seem significantly resonating with the Nepalese being the first generation migrants, as it is going to monitor their productive participation in the broader Australian society,

Step forward from here is to measure the benefits and impacts of the new policy and programs to determine what works.

As the fastest growing community in Australia, Nepalese are sure to be faced with the challenges of assimilation. So to address that, the Victorian Government has heightened their policy framework to ensure that the community such as ours are equipped to deal with the complexities of diversified

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Landmark policy in MULTICULTURALISM launched in Victoria

Por the first time, a clear set of indicators will be used to measure the state's progress in multicultural affairs. Victorian Government has launched a new multicultural policy amid a press meeting in Melbourne. Minister for Multicultural and Citizenship Hon. Nicholas Kotsiras and Victorian Premier the Hon. Dr Danish Napthine jointly unveiled the new and improved multicultural policy, Victoria's Advantage – Unity, Diversity, Opportunity, a landmark Multicultural Affairs and Citizenship Policy.

The Policy focuses on three major themes: Maximising the Benefits of our Diversity; Citizenship, Participation and Social Cohesion; and Responsive and Accessible Services.

The new policy also stipulates the role of the Victorian Government in relation to multiculturalism, government's approach to legislation, policy and responsive services and programs, understanding the trend of Victoria's growing diversity as well as recognising the challenges and the opportunities that comes with the state's changing demography.

Victoria's Advantage outlines a plan to support social cohesion and citizenship, while reducing instances of racial and religious discrimination.

Addressing the event Hon Minister kostsiras said Victoria is one of the most culturally diverse and cohesive societies in the world that is built on rich and multifaceted cultural heritage and this diversity underpins our identity as community. He asserted that multicultural community offer important connections to the rest of the world and make considerable contributions to the future prosperity.

Mr Kotsiras, himself a first generation Greek immigrant, paid tribute to the important contributions of Victoria's multicultural communities.

"Our state's cultural diversity is embraced as a source of pride and





presents tremendous opportunities going forward," Mr Kotsiras said. "As a government and a community, it is vital that we commit ourselves to strengthen Victoria's harmonious reputation for future generations."

Talking about the newly formed policy Minister Kostsiras said that the new policy was developed after extensive community consultation and is built on a solid foundation of partnerships within the Victorian community. He pointed that the new policy aims to establish social cohesiveness.

Premier Dr. Danish Napthine spoke about how the migrant community has contributed to the economic prosperity of Victoria. He said without the waves of migration to Victoria and Australia over the past centuries, we would not have the strong economy or the rich, diverse society that we have today. He added that the Victorian Government has always been proud of its cultural diversity and has a strong reputation for harnessing and developing its benefits. Premier also made a point that the Government

has made international engagement a priority, through Government led trade missions. He emphasised that the Victorian Government is committed to programs and policies that support the shared benefits of multiculturalism and the new policy is the testament of that.

"With more than 26 per cent of Victorians born overseas, Victoria is already a leading example of the many ways in which cultural diversity enriches our society," Dr Napthine said.

"This policy demonstrates the Victorian Coalition Government's commitment to diversity, using clear indicators such as labour force participation and school retention to strengthen multicultural affairs and citizenship in our great state."

Victoria's Advantage outlines a plan to support social cohesion and citizenship, while reducing instances of racial and religious discrimination.

The policy focuses on three major themes: Maximising the Benefits of our Diversity; Citizenship, Participation and Social Cohesion; and Responsive and





Accessible Services.

"A more comprehensive picture of Victoria's progress in multicultural affairs and citizenship, will better assist in identifying emerging trends and issues," Dr Napthine said.

Consul General of Nepal to Victoria, Mr. Chandra Yonzon, President of Nepalese Association of Victoria Mr. Bom Yonzon and the Chairman of Victorian Multicultural Commission Mr. Chin Tan were also present at the event.

Mr Pandey succeeded the former deputy chief of mission Mr. Lok bahadur Thapa who completed his term successfully before returning home recently.







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
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Table Tennis Australia acknowledges Atul's Talent



Nepali Engineer awarded with **GN Alexander Medal in Australia**

🖥 ngineers Australia has awarded the prestigious GN Alexander Medal for Hydrology and Water Resources to Nepali engineer Durga lal Shrestha. The award has been handed to Shrestha and his co-authors for their research paper in hydrology and water resources in an Australian publication over the period.

Engineer Shrestha and his team's research evaluated rainfall forecasts from the first generation Australian Numerical Weather Prediction (NWP) models over the Ovens catchment in southeast Australia. It also evaluated stream flow forecasts produced using the NWP rainfall forecasts as input to a hydrological model

GN Alexander was one of the greats in the early years of Australian hydrology. He was a member of the working committee which produced the first Australian Rainfall and Runoff and a regular



contributor at Hydrology Symposia.

The Award is presented at each Hydrology and Water Resources Symposium, held approximately at eighteen



month intervals. The award is judged by a panel appointed by the National Committee on Water Engineering. It was first awarded in Canberra in February 1988.



ven though I had travelled fair bit around Nepal, my only travel overseas was as far as to India. Years of rigid daily routine had not allowed me to go anywhere. But accepting an invitation from the families living in Australia me and my wife Sita Simkhada decided to embark on a great Australian journey last year. After a long and tiring flight we landed in Melbourne on 4th of June last year.

As soon as we touched down at Melbourne airport my Australian adventure began. The first challenge was thrown at me right away when I was asked to explain the custom officer about the gifts and souvenirs that we had brought from Nepal for our daughter, son in-law and our little grand-daughter. My inadequacy in English language was not helping the situation either. I used whatever little I knew of English and tried to get my message across. After all everyone understands the language of genuineness. After two hours of checking, the officer was satisfied enough to let me out. Anxiously waiting were the families that had come to receive us from the airport. The hugs and kisses with them had just made us forget about what had happened on

We jumped in the car and headed to Glenroy where my daughter was living. The very first day I realized how punishing can Melbourne's weather be? May be I was feeling it even more cause I had just come from Nepal's summer. The

My daughter Jyoti Simkhada and my son in-law Nirajan Gauli have done the best they can to make our stay comfortable in Australia. Since they know that I come from an education back ground they have been taking me around to the educational institutions

and universities for a visit. Visiting Melbourne University, Monash and Deakin Universities were pleasant experiences at the same time the realization that we are so backwards made me sad. I also notice that the government invests so much in education here. That has helped the little children get the best education unlike back home where children have to struggle for the most basic facility.

During our nine months stay here, I have had opportunities to travel many places. Adelaide, Bendigo, Ballarat, Geelong, Great Ocean Road, Oueenscliff to Sorrento by ferry, Shepparton and many other places that we have visited. I found





one striking similarity. The facilities are equally distributed. There are proper motor roads everywhere, electricity, transportation, town planning, everything is pre-planned. The highlight for me was that we were able to drink tea while our car was being driven at 100km/hr. That is obviously because of straight roads and smooth drive. That is not a possible scenario in Nepal.


In saying that there are things here that I wish there wasn't. People here find it so normal to have left their parents in nursing home. That saddened me a lot. May be that's not in my culture, but I wished if every elderly gets to spend their end days with their families.

It was quite difficult for us in some ways to adjust with the isolated lifestyle. Back home we are always on the go but not having to do anything and not having anyone to talk to, was quite hard. But thank god our little princess grand-daughter Nirjala has made our life so much easier. When she is there all the loneliness goes away. She has been a great companionship.

I was very happy to discover that there are so many Nepalese living here. I have attended many Nepali community events in last nine months. From the father's day ceremony organised by Narayan Kafle Bhai , Lumbini Kapil Vastu Day ceremony, Pipalbot tea party or the mega event like MAHA Yatra, every time I went to these Nepali functions I felt closer to home. It's quite pleasing to see our new generations putting in so much effort to preserve our culture and tradition in foreign land.

I also figured that the bunch of Nepalese here is the intellectual ones that came filtered from Nepal and left behind the ones that are of no use. I also understand that if there is any hope for Nepal to get better, it's you guys who have to take responsibilities. Quarter of the country's population is now overseas. Most of them are either old or too young. Who is going to work for the country's prosperity? That is my worry. If we can bring the political situation back on track there is so much we can do. And I want you all to come back home with skill, knowledge and little bit of money so you can return the love to your elderly parents and the country. And thank you all for making my Australia stay enjoyable.

Nepal marches in PAKO FESTA

epal participated in one of Australia's premier multicultural festival Pako Festa in Geelong on 22nd of February. This was the second consecutive year that Nepali team marched the vibrant town to ensure Nepal's representation in the culturally enriching event.

The annual 32nd Pako Festa was organized by Diversitat on which more than ninety different organizations of indigenous nationalities took part. The event was expected to attract more than hundred thousand visitors and would inject about AU\$ 2.5 million to the local economy.

Pako Festa is the largest free celebration of cultural diversity in Australia being organized annually since 1983. It provides a common platform for multicultural communities, professional performers, community groups, schools, businesses, street traders and artists from all walks of life to be acquainted among each other. Australian talent shines at the Oscars



Nana slams Sanjay Dutt

otwithstanding the support of Bollywood bigwigs to Sanjay Dutt, Nana Patekar today slammed the extension of parole to the jailed actor, saying he would never work with the convicted star.

The 63-year-old actor said the least he can do is boycott the films that Dutt stars in

"I have not worked with him in 22 years of my career, I will not work with him in future too," the actor told a news channel here.

"Government will do whatever they want. They are saying that it is legal, you can't say anything about it. But I will do whatever is in my hands," he added.

Dutt, 54, was convicted by the Supreme Court for illegal possession of arms in connection with the 1993 Mumbai serial blasts case and was sentenced to six years of imprisonment.

He had earlier served 18 months of jail and had surrendered himself before a Mumbai court on May 18, 2013 to serve the remaining period of his imprisonment.

"You will watch his films and make him a hero and later you say he shouldn't get parole. Things don't work like that. What can I do? Who will listen to me? People think he is only an actor. I am also a common man but who will consider that," Patekar said.

Patekar had spoken out against Dutt even at the time of his sentencing, saying he should not be given a favourable treatment for being an actor.

Dutt has drawn flak for getting parole of almost 100 days during his current jail term.







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Bill Gates once again the richest

Nepali billionaire Binod Chaudhary in the rich list for second year

orbes magazine announced its ranking of the world's billionaires last week. Gates, who led the list for 15 of the past 20 years, won the spot back from Mexican telecom mogul Carlos Slim Helu, who had topped the list for the past four years. Gates' net worth is estimated at \$76 billion; Slim Helu follows at \$72

Forbes says a record 1,645 billionaires made the list this year, with an average net worth of \$4.7 billion. That's up from 1,426 billionaires last year with a net worth of \$4.2 billion. Total net worth of this year's list was \$6.4 trillion, up from \$5.4 trillion

The magazine said that 1,080 of the billionaires were self-made, 207 inherited their wealth and 352 inherited a portion but are still growing it.

The largest net worth gainer on the list was Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg, who more than doubled his fortune to \$28.5 billion as the value of his company's stock soared. He ranks 21st on the list.

The social media giant helped bring a few notable newcomers to the list, including Facebook's Chief Operating Officer Sheryl Sandberg and WhatsApp founders Jan Koum and Brian Acton, who recently sold their business to Facebook for \$19 billion. Forbes said 268 billionaires were

new to the list, beating out a prior high of 226 newcomers in 2008. And a record number of women made the list this year, with 172 women joining, up 25 percent from last year.

Altogether 100 people dropped out of the rankings, while 16 passed away.

The U.S. was the country with the greatest number of billionaires at 492, followed by China with 152 and Russia with 111. Billionaires from four new countries joined, adding Algeria, Lithuania, Tanzania and Uganda to the geographic mix.

Nepal's first and only billionaire Binod Chaudhary has maintained his position in #1465th billionaire with his net worth of \$1.1 Billion. His wealth, has been estimat-

ed to have grown by ten percent this year. After debuting on the Forbes billionaire ranks last year, Binod Chaudhary who built most of his fortune overseas, remains Nepal's only billionaire. His conglomerate, the Cinnovation/ CG Group's assets include a controlling stake in Nepal's

Nabil Bank, a fast growing foods business best known for instant noodle brand Wai Wai and a string of hotels in Asia and more recently, in Africa where in a joint venture with Uganda's Mukwano group he's building hotels in Uganda, Rwanda and Burundi. Last year, CG diversified into telecom when it bought out ST Telecom, a rural telecom operator. Chaudhary, who never went to college, joined the family's textile trading business four decades ago and went on to expand his inheritance overseas. His three sons work with him; the eldest Nirvaan oversees interests in Nepal while Rahul and Varun are stationed abroad.

Lali Gurans Nepali Grocery opened in Coburg

Nepali owned grocery 'Lali Gurans' grocery shop has opened in Sydney Road, Coburg. Keeping in mind the Nepalese living around the area, the new grocery will mostly sell Nepali items such as Century Masala, Wai Wai noodles, tama(Bamboo Shoots) and other typical Nepali items as well as Indian spices. The grocery will also have a little cafe section where Nepali MoMo will be available.

According to the shop owner Bishal Budhathoki the shop will also provide the money transfer service for Nepalese.

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MEDICAL ELECTIVE:

Understanding the Health Care and Hospital System in Kathmandu, Nepal

n December 2013, I decided to undertake a three-week medical elective at two very different hospitals in Kathmandu, Nepal. The first hospital I volunteered at was the Civil Service Hospital of Nepal in New Baneshwor. This is a government-financed hospital built by the Chinese government as a gift to the government of Nepal. It is well regarded for its speciality in the haematology field. Importantly, government officials including existing government service workers, pensioners and retirees receive 50% concession for hospital charges. The second hospital I volunteered at was the Tribhubhan University, Teaching Hospital in Mahrajganj. Teaching Hospital is regarded as the best and biggest hospital in Nepal for many reasons: First, being the largest capacity hospital in the country, all kinds of disease patterns present and when people have a diagnostic dilemma, they come to this hospital because it focuses on rare diagnoses. Second, it places a big focus on academia and research and third, it also has provisions for the very poor (living below \$1 a day).

As I set out on my medical elective, the main goal was to gain an appreciation and understanding of the health care and hospital system in Nepal and contrast it to Australia. This article discusses some of the major differences I observed and experienced within the health care and hospital system and other related areas.

Lack of a strong primary health care system

I found the absence of a strong primary health care (PHC) provision in Nepal. Primary preventative care and

self-management are not considered as important and therefore, does not have a strong influence in Nepal. The concept of general practice does not contribute to a large proportion of outpatient care. Instead, the system is structured on outpatient departments (OPD) within hospitals where patients can have short consults with doctors according to the medical speciality i.e.: respiratory OPD, OBGYN OPD etc. and if further medical care is required, they self admit to the hospital. The process for OPD consults is one of a ticketing system whereby patients purchase a RS-25 ticket before consultation with the doctor. The nature of the consults are incredibly short,

lasting between 5-10mins and done in the presence of 2-3 other doctors who are consulting different patients at the same time. Therefore, there is lack of consideration for privacy and confidentiality in these circumstances. The consulting process is hectic and overcrowded as around 1500 patients are consulted every day (Teaching Hospital). Given the time frame and ratio of patients to consult, the provision of patient focus, holistic care and efficiency most likely overlooked.

Medical care provision

The second major difference noted was the provision of medical care according to affordability. As there is no health system in Nepal that provides universal coverage for medical care, the patient's health is based mainly on out of pocket expenses; therefore, the type of care received by patients in hospitals is based on fee they can afford. For example, the teaching hospital has up to 7,000 beds available. For those who can afford to pay RS- 600 a night, they are placed in a different ward and those who cannot are placed in a central area with 10 beds, open to public access. Amongst these poorer group of patients, some cannot even afford hospital care

priate parameters are put in place by the hospital to separate these patients into a scheme that receives free care by the hospital. Interestingly, the parameters to decipher these situations are very subjective and judgemental i.e.: if a patient can afford a mobile phone, they can afford medical care, or judging by the clothes they wear.

Patient education and management

The third major difference noted was the small focus on patient education and self-management. The Nepali popula-

and are therefore placed in a separate area beneath a sign that reads "too poor to receive medical care" (translated) so that the staff understand their financial situation before providing them with economically appropriate medical care. Furthermore, diagnostic tests ordered by doctors are also based on patient's income. If a patient can afford high-level medical care, expensive tests with definitive diagnosis outcomes are recommended, however, for those that cannot, only small-scale tests are ordered and ultimately pose a diagnostic problem for the medical team.

The very poor cannot even afford even the most basic tests, and so appro-



tion has a very different perspective and attitude about health and wellbeing in general compared to Australians and this is the prime reason for this discrepancy, which needs to be addressed. Nepali people often endure ill health until they reach severe circumstances and require hospital assistance. Their general attitude is that illness may be temporary and will get resolved in time without medical assistance. Alongside this attitudinal difference, a lot of patients cannot afford medical care or find it a nuisance to visit the doctor or the hospital, particularly if it interferes with their ability to make a living or responsibility to care for family. An example of this is a 38-week pregnant woman who refused to be admitted to the obstetrics ward despite being told by the doctor that she would give birth that day after a physical examination. Her main concern was that she had not been in pain and she needed to be home to look after her husband and family. The doctor proceeded to call her husband to explain the situation because many women don't tell their husbands about the consult and if pregnancy complications ensue, the husband makes complaints to the hospital. The focus of the patient education should not only be for patient awareness but also for medico-legal purposes to overcome social and societal issues.

In contrast, people in Australia deem it a right to have access to health care and place it as a priority to get general check-ups and medical care when they are ill. Although this is still an issue in the rural areas of Australia, this problem is minimal relative to the general Nepali population. Therefore, Nepali people require better patient education about what constitutes ill health, when it is important to visit a doctor and why it's important to have frequent general check-ups to better manage their health and avoid acute illness in the future.

Priorities

Nepal's health care and hospital system would benefit from a stronger primary health care system, which focuses on health education, awareness and preventative care alongside self-management of patients. This will help people manage their health within the community and reduce the pressure placed in secondary care within a hospital setting when patients are admitted severely ill and at the end spectrum of their disease state. It will also reduce hospital costs for patients and save the health cost for the country's economy. Furthermore, family

and friends of patients also need to be better educated alongside the patient about how to self manage their health at home and how to prevent illness to encourage them to seek health assistance in a timely manner.

Other areas of improvement that may be beneficial to improve the patients journey in the health care system includes strengthening doctor patient relationships, emphasis on holistic medical care and focus on mental health. Doctors are highly revered people in the community and patients respect them to the point that they will do anything a doctor advises even if it is beyond their wishes. This is because patients have an inherent belief that the doctor always knows best and often leave the most important decisions about their own health in the hands of someone else. Therefore, better communication between the doctor and patient regarding patient values, finances, personal, cultural and religious

beliefs are important to include in the decision making process for their health. Additionally, the focus of medicine in Nepal is one of a diagnostic or 'quick fix' rather than a holistic model of care. This model focuses on the patient's medical problem and aims to fix it rather than looking at the disease in the context of the person's life. This is where the doctor patient relationship is important to understand the barriers for providing the best medical care and quality of life for that particular patient. Finally, there is a little emphasis on mental health problems in Nepal. Most hospitals don't have a separate mental health ward, but a joint ward with around 10 beds. Interestingly, the most common causes of mental illness in Nepal include cases of Schizophrenia and depression; mainly post traumatic stress disorder. Although there are low prevalence of mental health conditions in Australia and there is a proper system to look after, on the

contrary in Nepal, a large majority of the population go undiagnosed because there is no screening system, little provision within the health care system and even less support for them within the community once diagnosed.



Summary

Overall, despite the need to improve parts of Nepal's health care and hospital system, there are so many positives I observed during my elective. I was mainly impressed by the efficiency of a third



world hospital system. The hospital system is able to cater for so many patients

without an abundance of resources or financial support. The hospital operational system was very efficient and there was a good working relationship between the medical officers, doctors, nurses and other staff. I was inspired by the ability of doctors to cater to a wide variety of patients in Nepal from different social, cultural, religious and economical backgrounds. The calibre of the staff was also very impressive in their level of expertise, knowledge and teaching. Furthermore, the staff-were incredibly friendly and taught me like I was a student of their own.

Having had the opportunity to undertake my medical elective in Kathmandu, Nepal, I have benefited in understanding the differences between hospital system structure and function between developing and developed countries. These experiences and perspectives I gained will help me enormously in my

clinical studies in Australia.









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




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Magar Samaj celebrated Kanung festival

epal's former foreign secretary Arjun Bahadur Thapa has assumed charge as secretary general of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) at a function organised at the SAARC Secretariat on 3rd of March...

Thapa succeeds outgoing secretary general from Maladives, Ahmed Salem, who completed his tenure February-end.

Thapa is the 12th secretary general of the eight-member SAARC regional grouping.

After taking charge as secretary general, Thapa told IANS that he would try his best to execute projects agreed to by the member states.

"The member states, in the past, had agreed to implement various regional and sub-regional projects and my priority would be to implement these projects at the earliest with the consent of the member states," he said.

Thapa was appointed to the post by the erstwhile Khil Raj Regmi government in September last year. SAARC picks its secretary generals according to the alphabetic order of the member states and this time it was Nepal's turn to

Nepal and India to discuss ways to ease transshipment

Nepal and India will discuss ways to facilitate transhipment of Nepal -bound cargo from third countries after the southern neighbour agreed to allow customs clearance to be done at the customs points on the border.

Currently, all the imports from third countries are required to clear Indian



customs in Kolkata. India had agreed to simplify the transhipment process to help Nepali importers cut costs during a commerce secretary-level Inter-Governmental Committee (IGC) meeting held in December in Kathmandu.

A delegation from the Commerce Ministry is scheduled to visit the southern neighbour in the second week of March to discuss the modality of clearance of goods at the customs points on the India n border.

'We have started preparing a format of the modality in coordination with the Department of Customs before heading for negotiations," said an official of the Commerce Ministry.

Nepali importers have been complaining that they are being forced to wait in a long queue at Kolkata port to clear their cargo through customs. Delays in clearance mean that they have to pay hefty amounts as demurrage.

If customs clearance is allowed to be done at points on the Nepal - India border, it is expected to shorten time-consuming procedures and reduce the costs for Nepal i traders. It could also help boost competitiveness of Nepali goods.

The two countries have amended the transit treaty enabling re-export of goods from Nepal to third countries through India . This provision will facilitate Nepal 's genuine third country exports of goods imported for the purpose of displaying them at fairs and exhibitions.



Nepali Big Bash in April

cllowing the footstep of Indian Premier League and Big Bash League in Australia, Nepal will have its own professional cricket league with corporate sector joining hands in Ncell Nepal Premier League (NPL) scheduled to begin in April. The first of its kind in Nepal, NPL include not just the Twenty20 tournament but also the 50-over and two-day events. All three formats will be played under the round-robin league by six teams, all supported by corporate houses.

Basanta Regmi will skipper the Kantipur Gurkhas, Paras Khadka will lead the Vishal Group Warriors, Sharad Vesawkar will captain Tej and Gyanendra Mall will



lead the Colors X Factor. Shakti Gauchan will captain the Jagdamba Giants and Binod Bhandari will lead the Sagarmatha Legends.

Each team will have a 16-member squad including current national, Under-19, regional and two overseas cricketers as well as domestic coaches. Nepal coach Pubudu Dassanayake, who selected all six teams, said the tournament would go a long way in filling the void of the domestic tournament.

"The Ncell NPL is a good thing for the development of cricket in Nepal as it will provide players with the much needed domestic exposure," said Dassanayake. Match fees per match for the captain has been fixed at Rs 5,000 while players in the senior national team will earn Rs 2,5000 and the U-19 and regional players will get Rs 1,000 each per match. The 50-over and T20 champion will get Rs 200,000 each while the winners will get Rs 1,50,000.
