

Labour Day: Labouring for change

The 125th International Labour Day was observed on 1st of May. The day comes once every year to mark our innate sense of fairness and equality, and our willingness to campaign for work liberalisation. It is the day we celebrate the winding back of the exploitation and oppressive working conditions. It is also a time for us to pay tribute to the efforts of the labour movement which brought the dignified and respectful working environment for us to enjoy at present.

It is a time when workers should be able to celebrate the consolidation of their rights. increased wages and benefits, improved working conditions, and the general progress of the labour movement. Unfortunately, even now, most workers are forced to lament the absence of any such gains. While workers globally observing International May Day, thousands of workers of different sectors are deprived even from their basic human rights. In one hand, many of the countries in the world are reluctant to ratify various conventions of the International Labour Organization (ILO) and UN and in another hand the implementation of existing national and international laws in many countries is very poor.

Political parties, their affiliated organizations, trade unions and labour unions celebrate the day as a landmark for the establishment of their rights. Speeches are made, marches were done, but have we done enough to improve the work place conditions for people around the world, the answer will be no. Even more so from Nepalese perspective. The continuous loss of lives of many Nepalese migrant workers in Oatar is an evidence that International Labour Day might have just been confined to



oreland city council has introduced Nepali acquisitions in its library at Coburg attributing to the corresponding needs of the rapidly growing Nepali population around the area. A program was held on 15th of April at Coburg Library to officially mark the opening of Nepali section of the library. As an inaugural collection, five hundred books, periodicals, DVDs and local Nepalese newspapers have been made available for lending. The initiative comes as a result of a year long perseverance of Nepalese Association of Victoria and some community individuals, particularly Solangture's Raju Shakya and local literary Anupam Sayar.

Today's inaugural program was attended by individuals and the representatives of various community organisations. As a chief guest, the Mayor, Councillor of Moreland city council Lambros Tapinos congratulated Nepali community on this important milestone and said the council is proud of the library facilities and what it offers to its residents and is always looking for ways to expand them to tailor the needs of growing multicultural communities. During his speech, Mr Tapinos also revealed a prospective plan to forge Kathmandu as a sister city of Moreland. He said "it's on agenda and we are in talks with the relevant agencies to form a sister city partnership with Kathmandu Municipality".

Chin Tan, Chair of Victorian Multicultural Council praised the Moreland City Council for acting vigilantly on identifying the need of growing Nepalese population around the area. He stressed "this symbolizes, the library is for people from all backgrounds and an initiative such as this reinforces our social cohesiveness." "I would love to see a Turkish boy pick up a Nepali book", Mr Tan added.

As the chief guest of the program, Honorary Consul General of Nepal to Victoria Mr Chandra Yonzon acknowledged Moreland City Council for their initiative and thanked everyone that has played a part to reach "Nepali Collection" to the fruition. He also expressed his gratitude to Bhutanese Community members for their unparalleled support along the process. Mr Yonzon also touched upon the importance of librar-

INTERNATIONAL LABOUR'S DAY SPECIAL

omen's participation in the labour market is significantly changing compared with yesteryears. A combination of changes in gender roles, access to justice, equal opportunities for education, and freedom of mobility is setting platform and creating opportunities for our women to excel in both personal and professional lives. The International Labour Day in itself is a day of recognition and acknowledges those who contribute to the overall prosperity and well-being of an individual, family, community and a nation. Thus, participation of women in the labour market should not to be taken for granted either. What defines "work" and which activities should be paid to reflect women's contribution in GDP is debatable. On the same note, it's time we bow our head respectfully for full time homemakers, as I cannot dare discount their efforts in weaving a social fabric. However, this article is solely focusing on women's participation in the labour market. Having said that, it also does not

mean women in other kinds of workplaces from factory floors to the Federal government are not worthy of reportage. For this article I am simply sharing success stories of our hidden treasures in Australia, in their own words, hence please stay with me.

Out of total population of 27.47M in Nepal, total adult literacy rate is 57.2 (65.7 per cent of females) but only 80.4 per cent have joined the labour force (UN Human Development Report, 2013). GDP per capita average annual growth rate of Nepal from 1990-2012 is 2.3 per cent. Population below international poverty line of US\$ 1.25 per day (%) 2007-2011 is 24.8. Simply interpreting these figures show women are no longer subordinate to men; however, facts compared to figures do not always reflect positive changes in many developing nations. In Nepal, women are rarely recognised as a primary breadwinner in many families, improvements on the status of women continues to be a battle. In Australia, irrespective of work

place reforms and Flexi-working hours, women's participation in many areas is still less pronounced. Therefore, what interests me the most is to hear what it's like to cross the ocean to achieve one's dream, coming from one of the world's most underdeveloped countries?

Research shows that since 1945 the most non-English speaking background women who have migrated to Australia have come as dependents of men as wives, daughters and mothers. This is due to the Australian government's immigration programs and policies to assisting entry of males with appropriate skills. In the context of Nepalese, migration of skilled women was low to nil back then, possibly due to the low level of education. Today, this is changing. Saying marketable, skillful and qualified women to enter the labour market is not lacking may not be an exaggeration. In saying this I asked a few women to describe their journeys in Australia and what are the three things they advise to others aspiring to be in their positions?



RASHMI SINGH, BPA (CSU) Director, Affordable Shipping Pty Ltd

e, my husband (Bishnu Singh) and I, arrived in Australia in 2009 on a student visa; with lots of dreams and in search of opportunities, but left our daughter (Shuvani) back in Nepal. The fear of upfront tuition fees, work limitations, so called culture and lifestyle got the best of us, but we both promised to achieve our destination together. Luckily we both got our dream jobs in the same company and gathered wealth of experience. Within two years, while on a student visa, we launched our family venture - Affordable Shipping Pty Ltd. Highly ambitious as it may sound, we had NO tangible assets; only IDEAS and STRENGTH and nothing more. Nonetheless, we nailed on marketing strategies.

Life has turned around, today, I am a home based business woman, and I occasionally visit our office that is run by my husband. Fortunately, there is no looking back.

Therefore, for aspiring students, I suggest to:

- concentrate on your studies first that is what you are here for in the first place
- develop a sense of purpose, so identify your personal strengths
- have faith and work hard transition as a new student migrant can be tough

fter completing Bachelor of Dentistry from India and working as a full-fledged dentist in Nepal, my journey in Australia began with a marriage and I started from scratch. Balancing newly married life and attempting a registration exam (known to be one of the toughest board exams) kept me on my toes. As the saying goes, I had to sacrifice, give up comfort and convenience to achieve the goal. Successfully completing my clinical ADC examination came with a big price; my beautiful family of three separated to live in two different cities in Australia. and son (Aarav) in Nepal. ADC clinical examination was a mammoth. However, there was no giving up.

My husband, Suman Adhikari is a blessing of my life, whose faith and belief has helped me enjoy work-life balance.







ar Northern Queensland's media Cairns Post has covered a story of a Nepali student Som Tamang, who despite all adversities received his graduation from James Cook University recently. The coverage has talked about Tamang's personal journey from being a child slave in Nepal to achieving Australian degree in Media design.

Mr Tamang has said to Nepalese Voice that he was humbled by the gesture of cairnspost.

"Former Nepalese child slave gains university degree from JCU in Cairns"

NO education was harder come by than that of Som Tamang, who donned trencher cap, academic gown and satin hood last week to realise a 20 year dream and create a piece of Nepalese history.

Forced out of school at age 10 to help support his family, the former child slave, street hawker and buffalo herder beamed as he was awarded a Bachelor of Creative Industries (Media Design) at James Cook University's annual graduation in Cairns.

In doing so, he became the first person from his village of Batase to graduate from university.

Had he followed the path expected by his parents, he would have been married by 14, a grandfather in his 20s, and trapped in the cycle of poverty most Nepalese know.

Instead, he arrived in Australia at 18, resurrected his education through TAFE and finally gained entry to James Cook University at 25.

"My dream of wanting to go to university died when I was about 14. That's when I knew my life had to be about supporting my family and letting them learn about the world," says Som.

The 30-year-old has since founded a charity to educate Nepalese children -Friends of Himalayan Children - has established two business and now has

three children of his own. He said he felt liberated after his decades-long academic journey.

"It's like I could breathe - a feeling of freeness and achieving something I never dreamt of," he said.

JCU Vice-Chancellor Professor Sandra Harding said Som's story gave her "goose bumps" and his achievement would impact his family for generations.

"It brings to mind the transformational power of education," Prof Harding said. "One person from a disadvantaged background who achieves higher education is likely not only to reap the benefits of that for themselves, but it will be transformational for generations to come for their community.

Bharat Pokharel becomes only a third Nepali to advocate in Australian apex court

Sydney based Bharat Pokharel has become only the third Nepali to have been eligible to advocate in the supreme court of Australia as a solicitor.

His Master's Degree in Australian Law earned him such academic acclamation making him only a third Nepali after Dr Samsher Singh Thapa and Bunu Gautam. Pokharel earned the degree from University of Technology, Sydney. With receiving the degree, he is eligible to



advocate at the apex court of New South Wales as well as to further his professional career in law

Pokharel is a well-known figurein Nepali communities living in Australia for his social engagements. He is the current secretary and former treasurer of NRNA Australia. Before exceling into law he was an accounting professional. Pokharel now also holds an unique portfolio of becoming a first Nepali to have become a solicitor as well as Accounting practitioner at the same time.

He currently runs a business firm Pokharel and Associates that provides counseling services in accounting and migration.

Pokharel was born in Jakhe of Dolkha district of Nepal in 2033 BS. His family migrated to Lalbandi of Sarlahi district when he was one year old then later shifted to Kathmandu when he was 8. He passed SLC from Bhanubhakta Memorial Secondary School, Kathmandu in

He arrived Australia in 1996 after completing I.Sc. from Kathmandu Univer-

Nepali communities in Australia has expressed happiness in Pokharel's achievents. Many believe his is the story of self belief and dedication that will inspire many in the community.

Forget Australian PR, farming in Nepal is more satisfying for Srijan

rijan Pyakurel, from Biratnagar discarded his Australian permanent residency to go back to Nepal and take up farming. Srijan gave up something that he worked hard six years for, starting his own farmland in Tankeshowri, Biratnagar but he has no regrets. Far from his accounting degree that he acquired from University of Southern Queensland, he now toils himself into fish-keeping, goat and cow farming.

He lived in Australia for six years, got married, got his degree but his natural pull was to go back and do something in his own country. An international degree-holder searched a career in a 'less-revered' profession like agriculture, that too in Nepal where there is no adequate infrastructures, resources and government policy for people like Srijan. He said " I wanted to give something back to my country and agriculture was my choice cause I wanted to challenge the traditional thought that it's only for

He has invested Rs 20 million in the farming so far where he sees enormous potentials in the days ahead. He has already started to get returns from fish keeping in less than eight months since he began. "I am planning to increase investment," he said. Con couple dupes 120 Nepalese by promising job in Australia

ore than 120 Nepali nationals have been duped by three fraudsters including two Nepalese. They pocketed large amounts by promising the victims, jobs in an Australian cruise.

The Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of the city police is currently investigating the the matter. To make their con look genuine, the accused had taken an office space in a posh Bhandup mall on rent and had even sent the victims for

marine training in Kolkata. The unique factor in this case is that although the conspiracy was hatched in Nepal, the

execution took place in Mumbai.

The suspects against whom the First Information Report (FIR) has been registered have been identified as PK Singh, Yuvraj Adhikari and Nirmala Adhikari. According to EOW sources, the Adhikari couple has masterminded the entire fraud. "The couple had placed a bogus advertisement in a local newspaper in Nepal wherein they had claimed that they would provide jobs with lucrative salary in a reputed and international cruise company and the posting would be in Australia," said an EOW officer, requesting anonymity.

He added that after reading the advertisement many people got attracted towards it and contacted Adhikari couple.

The officer said that the couple told the victims that they would be sent for a short marine training in Kolkata and they would have to board flight from Mumbai to Australia once the money transaction and documentation is over. In the month of February, the victims were sent for training in Kolkata and then they were asked to get in touch with one PK Singh, an alleged company




representative of the couple in Mumbai. Singh had rented an office in a posh mall in Bhandup where victims contacted him, police said.

The victims were given bogus documents of the cruise company and over Rs1.50 crore were taken by the accused from 120 victims in cash. The transaction had taken place in March. The job aspirants were told that their flight will take off on April 9 and two days before that they would be given visas. However,

when the victims contacted the Bhandup-based office of the company they were shocked to find it locked.

The officer said that neither Adhikari nor Singh could be contacted after which they lodged police complaint.

According to senior police inspector Prashant Marde from Bhandup police station, they have registered a case of cheating and forgery in this regard and have transferred the case to EOW for further investigation.

back to Skilled Migration in South Australia

outh Australian State Government recently announced that 18 high demanding occupations including Cooks and Hairdressers are back into the list of their SNOL (State Nomination Occupation List). This means Cooks and Hairdressers with a positive full skill assessment and IELTS 6.0 in each band might be eligible for Skilled Nominated visas such as subclass 190 (Permanent) and 489 (Temporary).

Several years ago, Cooks and Hairdressers were removed from SOL (Skilled Occupation List). These occupations remained in the CSOL (Consolidated Skilled Occupation List), therefore people still can apply for 457 visa and/ or ENS or RSMS. Currently SA, NT and TAS governments are nominating both occupations for subclasses in Australia.

Unfortunately, Nominated pathways requires full skill assessment, therefore people who holds provisional skill assessment for 457 is not eligible for this pathway.

Those people who holds subclass 489 is allowed to remain in Australia maximum 4 years. Within 4 years, if they meet the requirements, they can apply for subclass 887 which is permanent resident visa. Basically, they need to remain in the Sponsored State at least 2

years and work over 35 hours per week for 52 weeks.

When Cooks and Hairdressers were removed from the State Sponsorship lists several years ago, it was devastating for international students studying these trades.

Education providers in the vocational educational sector were also hit hard by the changes. But now there is some good news.

The most recent news is that SA has added Cooks and SA to the State Nominated Occupation Lists. This will be most beneficial to past students, that have a full skills assessment, but have not been able to get state sponsorship.

Financial documents from any banks acceptable: Australian Court

Australian Federal Circuit Court has termed the Australian Immigration's rule to accept financial documents from only two Nepali banks Nabil and SBI, unlawful. This comes as the latest development on Australian Immigration's decision to halt the visa application of two thousand Nepalese students saying the financial documents submitted by them were fraudulent.

Before this, Nepalese students were required to provide financial documents from the designated banks as part of their visa application to Australia. After the court's decision, restriction on the matter has lifted. Any financial institutions, as long as they are registered, will be able to provide loan documents to students from now on. However, granting a visa will still remain Immigration's prerogative.

The decision comes after Australia based Solicitor Dr. Shamser Thapa filed a case in April last year against

Sydney migration agent jailed for fraud

Migration agent Ms Xiao Ying Wu also known as Amy Wu has been jailed for fraud. She was based in Sydney's Chinatown and pleaded guilty to forging immigration documents and defrauding her clients, who were seeking assistance with visa applications, in order to obtain more than \$80 000.

The Federal Government said that the jailing of a former migration agent for immigration fraud sent a strong message to the industry that fraudulent and illegal behaviour will not be tolerated.

She was sentenced today in the Downing Centre District Court to 21 months' imprisonment, with five months to be served, in relation to two Commonwealth charges of using false documents to obtain benefit

She also received 18 months' im-

prisonment with five months' minimum term (to be served concurrently) for two charges under the NSW Crimes Act of dishonestly obtaining a financial advantage.

The court also made a reparation order in relation to the Commonwealth charges of \$13 405 and \$18 935 to the respective victims and a compensation order relating to the state charges of \$31 550 and \$10 000 for her victims.

Any individual who provides immigration assistance in Australia must be registered as a migration agent with the Office of the Migration Agents Registration Authority. Nepalese doing time in Thai Jail seek royal pardon

joint team from the Nepali embassy in Thailand and the Non-Resident Nepalis Association in Thailand (NRNA-Thailand) has learnt about the condition of Nepalis serving jail terms in Thai prisons.

The team comprising Charge d'Affaires at the embassy Dor Nath Aryal, NRNA-Thailand President Khagendra Raj Dhakal and embassy official Hari Bahadur Thapa has learnt about the condition of Nepalis doing time in Thai

According to Dhakal, the prisoners requested the embassy to take the initiative to seek a royal pardon for them so that they would be able to return to a normal life back in Nepal.

Altogether 70 Nepalis are serving jail terms in various Thai prisons. The team held meetings with Nepalis inmates at Bang Kwang Central Jail and the Central Women's Jail in Thailand on Saturday.

While 21 Nepalis males are in Bang Kwang, nine women are doing time in the Central Women's Jail.

Other Nepalis are in Klong Prem Prision and Chiang Mai Prison. Most of them were arrested on charges of drug smuggling.

According to Dhakal, the inmates whom the joint team met on Saturday requested them to take the initiative to let them serve their remaining jail terms in Nepal itself. They complained that they were facing difficulties due to lack of knowledge of the Thai language.

Altogether 24 countries have reached an agreement with Thailand under which their nationals in Thai prisons can serve the rest of their terms in their own respective countries. Nepalis in Thai prisons can also be taken to Nepal to serve their remaining jail terms once Nepal inks a similar agreement with

Dhakal of NRNA-Thailand said most Nepalis in Thai jails seemed to be innocent and illiterate people who had been used by those involved in smuggling

illegal drugs. He said there is a need to organize awareness programs to prevent innocent Nepalis being arrested under such circumstances



NRNA to provide aid to family of Everest avalanche be held in US to promote victims

Non-Resident Nepali Association International Coordination Council (NRNAICC) President Shesh Ghale has announced to provide Rs 1 million to the families of Everest avalanche victims. Mid last month sixteen high altitudes Nepali guides died and three others went missing in an deadly avalanche in the Mt Everest. Six others were injured in the incident.

Releasing a statement, NRNA President Ghale also expressed a condolence to the families of deceased. He urged the government to pay adequate attention for avoiding such disaster in the future.

Health and Diaspora, were presented and discussed for two days.

England, Scotland and Wales, participants from Denmark, Vienna, Nepal, The Netherlands, Germany and Norway are taking part in the program.

Nepal Study Days is organized in different Universities in the UK and this year. The program is hosted in Oxford with the support of School of Anthropology and Museum Ethnography and All Souls College. The conveners of this year's program in Oxford were Professor David Gellner, Dr Krishna Adhikari and Dr Sondra Hausner. 
Nepali scientist involved in groundbreaking physics research in the US

important discovery in nuclear physics after the discovery of Higgs boson also named as God's particle.

Meeting FOOD SECURITY is the topmost priority for South **Asia and Sub-saharan Africa**

cientists from national agricultural research systems, consortium group of international agricultural research (CGIAR) centres, and from global projects related to food security and climate change from over 15 countries from South Asia. Sub-saharan Africa, USA, Netherlands and Australia met and discussed about the food security issues in South Asia and Sub-saharan Africa. This international event, organized by the Global Yield Gap Atlas (GYGA) initiative supported by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, USA and commissioned by University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Wageningen University Research and ICRISAT (international Crop Research Institute for Semi-arid Tropics)-Kenya, aims to develop global atlases for yield potential, yield gap and water productivity gap of major food crops grown in south Asia and Sub-saharan Africa

Every crop variety has its genetic and climatic yield potential (Yp) while in farmers' field the yield of the same variety (called actual yield, Ya) is much lower than its Yp. The difference between Yp and Ya is yield gap (Yg) which is large and is variable across the districts or regions within a country or across the countries. While genetic Yp can be derived from well-managed field experiments the climatic Yp is estimated from crop growth simulation models only. The challenge for agricultural scientists and researchers is to identify the causes of yield gaps of crop varieties and develop and implement intervention strategies to close the gaps. Once the yield gaps are closed farmers yields, productionand income will be increased and food security of poor countries will be improved. This requires specific analysis and specific research and policy agenda for specific countries, says

Dr. Jagadish Timsina, Honorary Principal Fellow, University of Melbourne and Consultant to GYGA initiative, who was one of the delegates representing Bangladesh, Nepaland Australia and delivered a paper during the intensive 2-days (25-26 March) workshop at ILRI (International Livestock Research Institute) campus in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, followed by one day (27 March) field visit to examine the crops and cropping systems in farmers' fields in Amhara region of Ethiopia.

Delegates from the participating countries pre sented the Yp and Yg results from their countries. Since crop variety Yp is determined by climatic factors but Ya is a result of biophysical and socio-economic factors, the results from various participating countries required quite a bit of discussion and clarifications. At the end of intensive 2 days of deliberations and discussions, delegates agreed on outcomes and achievements so far and developed a work plan for the next 12

months. On the third day, delegates visited the "Africa Rising" project site in Amhara region located about 150 km from Addis Ababa. This project is funded by USAID for research on sustainable intensification in west, east and southern Africa and in Ethiopian highlands. While we visited some representative crop trials and irrigation arecated to that region so that research could attempt to close the gap between Yp and Ya. In contrast, if there is low Yg of rice in another region then perhaps funds could be allocated for research to increase Ypitself or the country could allocate the resources for research to close Yg of other crops in that region. However, many other factors need to

as and interacted with participating farmers and extension workers in the project, I was particularly amazed by the excellent road network across the country, decent airport and airport services, and beautiful natural landscape with mountains and hills that Ethiopia has, says Dr. Timsina, If Ethiopia can construct such nice wider roads and maintain them adequately in mountains and hills why not Nepal can do the same in its mountains and hills, Dr. Timsina keeps on thinking.

The GYGA initiative started 2 years ago and aims to finalise the atlases by March 2015. Once these atlases will be prepared they will be useful for policy makers of various countries to allocate the funds for research and extension of crop commodities to various zones and regions of those countries. For example, if there is high Yg of rice in a region then funds could be allobe considered. Most countries of South Asia and Sub-saharan Africa have a problem of increasing population growth rate every year with great challenge of feeding their population. Thus the information on Yg and its analysis will be extremely useful to address the food security issues and meet food demand of these countries. Such yield gap analyses and atlases will be highly useful for agricultural researchers and extension workers in Nepal as a benchmark for prioritizing the research and extension agenda and targeting the research sites and developing extension strategies, and will be useful for policy makers for allocating funds to specific regions for research and extension and for expansion of areas under crops of interest. These all will be necessary to close the yield gaps of various crops, address food security issues and meet food demand of the country, says Dr. Timsina.

PERSONALITY OF THE MONTH

MADHU MARASINI

Senior Nepalese government official and Australia Awards alumnus

n 2004, Nepali citizen and Australia Awards scholar Madhu Marasini, graduated from the Australian National University (ANU) with a Masters of International and Development Economics. A decade later. Madhu is now Chief/Joint Secretary International Economic Cooperation Coordination Division of the Ministry of Finance in Nepal, leading the direction of foreign aid to finance development projects in Nepal's prioritised sectors. He also continues to promote the benefits of the Australia Awards and, in his role as a high-achieving alumnus, recently participated in the selection of 39 Nepali Australia Awardees for the 2014 intake.

The benefits of Australian Government scholarships in supporting the development priorities of countries through educational opportunities have been acknowledged by Mr Marasini, who has said that, "the Australia Awards have changed my thinking and improved my confidence level. This opportunity was an eye opener too. I hope future scholarships to Nepal will help create a good pool of talent in Nepal, and develop people who can really contribute to the economic development of this country." Following on from this comment, Mr Marasini was kind enough to spend some time answering questions related to his time as an awardee, which are shared below.

What are the achievements you are most proud of so far?

I have institutionalised the Aid Management Platform (AMP) in the Ministry of Finance, which is now a public portal on aid data in Nepal.



from their own home. This will not only help enhance aid transparency but also assists in augmenting aid effectiveness. Nepal's AMP now has become an exemplary tool. Many aid recipient countries have been visiting Nepal to learn from our experience.

Likewise, when I was working for the Inland Revenue Department, I worked to introduce the Value Added Tax (VAT) system in Nepal for the first time. I am happy to see that now the VAT is one of the major sources of revenue for the Government of Nepal. The VAT system, as well as my work establishing the Anti-Money Laundering Department, has paved a stronger way for tax reform

What do you think are the main development priorities for Nepal, and what changes in the next decade?



Nepal's infrastructure has room to grow. Building infrastructures of power and roads are critically important. Economic growth cannot be achieved, and employment cannot be generated, without the availability of electricity and road connection. Nepal should focus on utilising its abundant water resources to produce electricity and boost export. Tourism is another sector, where we have the comparative advantages too. Similarly, as over 70% of the population still live in farming communities, enhancing agricultural productivity and promoting commercialisation of agriculture is another critical priority.

Thinking back to your time as an Australia Awardee, what did you gain from your experience in Australia?

I gained self-confidence, an understanding of multicultural values and expanded my contacts and networks. I have been able to apply the knowledge and skills that I had learned at ANU to my job. The teachers were superbly helpful, and the Aussie people were very friendly. After finishing my Masters at ANU I gained a promotion to the joint secretary level of the Government. That is just one step behind becoming a Secretary of the Government of Nepal.

What kind of friendships and professional connections have you maintained since your return to Nepal, and how have these benefited you?

I am in constant touch with friends from other countries who have been working in the ministries of finances, foreign affairs and other multilateral and bilateral development organisations such as Asian Development Bank, the World Bank and DFAT. We exchange views from time to time on the issues related to economic and social development in our respective countries and at the global level too. I have also been maintaining regular contact with some of my professors from ANU. Their emails encourage me to take challenges and apply new knowledge into my work.

NSW and Victorian Governments unite to oppose change to federal racial vilification laws

he NSW and Victorian Governments has announced they had lodged formal submissions opposing changes to the protections against racial vilification contained in the Federal Racial Discrimination Act

Victorian Minister for Multicultural Affairs and Citizenship Matthew Guy and NSW Minister for Citizenship and Communities Victor Dominello said: "We consider it vital that the Commonwealth does not weaken protections in place against racial vilification."

"The proposed changes threaten the social cohesion and well-being of not just our states' culturally and religiously diverse communities, but also the wider Australian community. "We support the protections currently in place under the Federal Racial Discrimination Act and emphasise the practical and symbolic importance of these protections - particularly for our Aboriginal, multicultural and multi-faith communities.

"Successive NSW and Victorian Governments have worked hard to foster socially inclusive and cohesive communities.

"This is the basis for the Victorian Equal Opportunity Act 2010 and Racial and Religious Tolerance Act 2001 and the NSW Anti-Discrimination Act 1977.

"Unlike the Commonwealth laws, the NSW and Victorian statutes also include criminal prohibitions for serious racial vilification."

"Vilification on the grounds of race or religion is always wrong and we should never allow it to sanctioned, whether intentionally or otherwise.

The Federal Government's Exposure Draft on the Freedom of Speech (Repeal of s.18C) Bill 2014 was released on 25 March and public submissions closed on 30th of April.

"It is important that people from non-English speaking backgrounds are engaged by the AFL to provide input into targeted strategies. This will ensure that any plans and investments are informed by appropriate cultural insights and expertise."



Men in 'healthy' countries have eyes for beauty!

Il the pretty women out there, if wooing a man is what is in your mind, move on to a country where conditions are not that harsh as feminine charm sweeps men living in countries with 'healthy' conditions.

A study has found that men living in unhealthy conditions are less attracted to pretty faces than their counterparts living in healthy conditions.

For example, a man living in Nepal or Nigeria finds a woman with large eyes, full lips and a soft jaw not as

appealing as a man in Japan or Australia may find her.

"In harsh conditions, men may have a better chance of fathering children who survive if they mate with a woman who can hold on to resources," said Urszula Marcinkowska, a doctoral candidate at University of Turku

in Finland. "It might pay off for men in hard conditions to develop a preference for women who are not very highly feminine, because feminine women are perceived to be less socially dominant," Marcinkowska was quoted as saying.

For the study, researchers recruited 1,972 heterosexual men online from 28 countries and presented them with photos of women altered to look more or less feminine.

The study appeared in the journal Biology Letters.



Obsessed with selfies? You might need help

e see people taking selfies everywhere nowadays. Its kind of a fashion for someone to have clicked at themselves randomly . A study has shown that obsession with selfies might be related to one's medical condition. Taking lots of selfies is not an addiction but a symptom of Body

Dysmorphic Disorder (BDD), psychologists warn.

"Two out of three of all the patients who come to see me with Body Dysmorphic Disorder (BDD) since the rise of camera phones have a compulsion to repeatedly take and post selfies on social media sites," explained David Veale, a consultant psychiatrist at The Priory Hospital, London.

In a first such study, experts have linked selfies with mental illness and have suggested that people regularly searching for the perfect angle from which to portray themselves could in some cases be ill.



"Taking selfies is not an addiction - it is a BDD symptom that involves checking one's appearance," Veale was quoted as saying in a Sunday Mirror report.

Selfie fans with BDD can spend hours trying to take pictures that do not show any defects or flaws in their appearance, which they are very aware of but which might be unnoticeable to others.

Often, people who take selfies take several photographs until they find their best angle or pose, but picking out small details can make people very self-conscious about the tiniest of 'flaws', the report added.
