Challenge ahead

Political parties will have to face a number of challenges as they begin discussion in the CA session. Forming government, accommodating parties in government, allocating ministry -port-





even on January 12, 2014, some 45 days after the official declaration of final election results. Leaders of political parties passed time in interpreting the mandate or positioning themselves and bargaining for power in the new political equation which emerged through the election.

Two big parties NC and CPN UML should have been more effortful in avoiding the delay in re-launching parliamentary process. They should have focused on discussing all political problems in the CA. If such delay continues in future and if their attention is diverted for one excuse or the other they would not be able to deliver constitution in one year as pledged by them in their election manifestoes.

A number of petty issues raised by political parties also did not allow them to concentrate on parliamentary process. The issue of electing new President and Vice-President in accordance with the spirit of the new mandate was raised strongly by CPN UML. Nepali Congress did not like to be engaged in such move. This brought about a difference between

The issue of reviving the old High Level Political Mechanism in the present context also kept the parties involved in political debate. Although many questioned its relevance in the changed po-





The question of summoning the first session of the CA is another point that kept political parties engaged in dialogue. Some argued for summoning the session by the President as per the international norm while others stood for summoning by the Chairman of Council of Ministers as mentioned in the Interim Constitution. A few moved the Supreme Court for settling the issue. Efforts are being made for working out a solution to it politically by making Chairman summon the session upon advisory from the President.

The UCPN (Maoist) which has been placed in the third position this time as against its position of single largest party in the dissolved CA first challenged the verdict, then threatened not joining the CA besides declining to send and its 33-party Alliance which boycotted the election. Although all political parties emphasize the need to include the Alliance in the constitution making process they have not yet entered into serious discussion for this.

All 30 political parties which won seats in the CA faced a tough challenge in selecting candidates from the closed list submitted to the Election Commission. It took quite long for them to select winners. The decisions of the party leadership were challenged by members of all parties. The issue of wrong selection is emerging as a problem for party unity in all parties. Leaders could not adhere to a parameter for selecting winners. They appear to have adopted nepotism and finance as parameters in selecting candidates. This resulted in

dence in Koteshwor, Kathmandu to hand over the money.



Financial irregularities surfaced in Nepali Congress Australia committee

A serious financial dispute has surfaced in Nepali Congress (NC)'s Public Relations Committee (PRC) Australia Working committee members of the PRC have accused the incumbent president of misappropriating NRs 26,00,000 from the committee fund without the consent of the

A press statement signed by committee vice president and majority members of the working committee states that committee president Santosh Sitaula has been removed from the post for working against the moral principle of the organisation.

The committee collects its fund from the committee membership fee and renewal fee.

Taking advantage of his post, Sitaula allegedly withdrew A\$ 26,355 from bank without the knowledge of committee members, the statement claims. Treasurer of the committee, Arjun KC, has resigned from the committee in the wake of financial irregularities. In a separate statement, KC informed that he decided to resign after finding the misappropriation of the committee fund by using a his forged signature. He denied his involvement in the misappropriation.

The committee will probe the financial irregularities and take action against him," said acting president of the committee, Suresh

However, Sitaula has contended the allegations against him and denied having withdrew the amount by using forged signature. He said he withdrew Rs 1,00,000 to send the amount to Nepal for November 19 CA elections and the remaining amount needs

to be calculated.

"We are preparing to conduct an audit of the entire expenses and submit a report," said Sitaula. In a statement, Sitaula has claimed that the allegation was aimed at assassinating his character.



ollywood hit 'Dhoom 3' has created history in Nepal by becoming the first film to mint Rs 6 crores at the box office. The movie - starring Aamir Khan, Katrina Kaif and Abhishek Bachchan - earned the amount in just two weeks. The film has been screened without competition at multiplexes across Nepal, including the Kathmandu Valley.

According to sources close to the film's distributor, 'Dhoom 3' is the first film to earn Rs 6 crores in Nepal.

A Nepali film is considered a hit if it earns around Rs 20 lakhs at the box office. By that standard, 'Dhoom 3' has earned the equivalent of 30 hit Nepali films.

Last year, around 60 foreign films released in three multiplexes in Kathmandu earned over Rs 20 crores.

Indian films dominate Nepal's movie halls. It is only in remote villages where Nepali films have a high demand.

In major cities like Kathmandu, Biratnagar, Pokhara and Bhairahwa, Hindi films have an 80 per cent share of the market. The quality of Nepali films is deteriorating though the number of movies produced every year has touched 120. A decade ago, Nepali films used to earn Rs 50 lakhs to 60 lakhs but now they hardly make Rs 15 lakhs to 20 lakhs.

amu Samaj Victoria celebrated "Tamu Lochhar" at Cyprus Community Hall, Lygon Street yesterday. Similar programs were organised in other states of Australia as well. The program was largely attended by indigenous Mongolian and Gurung community as well as people from various backgrounds. The renowned monk from Nepal had performed a prayer at the start of the program which was followed by other cultural programs showcasing Nepal's ethnic multiplicity.

Alongside the Gregorian New Year and Maghi, vibrant series of Lochhar is Celebrated by the Mongolian Buddhist communities of Nepal and overseas, Lochhar has its own unique flavors of New Year celebrations. In addition to the regular rituals and revelries of a festive occasion, Lhosar (or Lochhar in the case of Gurungs/Tamus) is also a crucial event in terms of establishing a cultural identity in a milieu of Nepal's caste and indigenous ethnic diversity.

'Tamu' means Gurung, 'Lo' means year and 'chhar' means new. This festival is celebrated t since times immemorial, based on the twelve symbols of Tibetan astrology. According to the Tibetan calendar, the Year of the Water Snake is coming to an end and the Year of the Horse is about to begin.

People tie threads dipped in turmeric on their necks to ward off evil omens and take blessings from our

Sonam Lhosar is celebrated by all those communities who follow the Tibetan civilization in Nepal. They are Tamang, Yolmo, Dura, the Thakalis of Mustang, the Dolpalis, and the Sinsas from Sankhuwasabha. Sixteen different countries in the world celebrate it on the same day, making it the most celebrated one out of all four Lhosars. In addition to the two, there is the third kind of Lhosar called Gyalpo Lhosar which falls in Fagun, corresponding to the second or third week of February. It used to be the New Year of the royalties. It is also known as King's (gyalpo) Lhosar. It is celebrated by the Lamas, the Sherpas of Nepal, and those living in Lhasa and Eastern Tibet.

Slightly in contrast to these Lhosars there remains The Tola Lhosar which. according to Professor Gurung, is slowly reaching the point of extinction. It is celebrated on the first day after the full moon in Paush which in the first week of January in Bhutan, Humla, Manang, and in the Mansarovar area of Western Tibet.

Regardless of the variations in the celebrators and the way of celebrating it, Lhosar/Lochhar is an integral part of our national identity. It binds together those who follow a certain culture and calendar irrespective of their religious orientation. Lhosar, with its cheerfulness and warmth, brings the diverse Mongolian family under the same umbrella and gives the country another reason to celebrate, at times in sync with many other countries of the world.

After completing my BSc Forestry degree, I worked for the Ministry of Forests and Soil Conservation in Nepal for 10 years (1993-2003). During this time. I introduced an innovative concept to boost forest planting among rural and urban people, known as "Memorial Forest Plantations", where a person plants tree in the name of their passed loved one and pay the local

My relationship with Australia and USQ commenced with the commencement of my PhD in 2003. After being presented with four PhD scholarship offers from overseas universities, I decided to undertake my PhD in Australia and particularly at University of Southern Queensland (USQ) where I received an International Postgraduate Research


Scholarship (IPRS). My PhD project focussed on the dynamism of reforestation activities in the face of carbon trading. It is a multi-disciplinary study, which addresses environmental externality and sustainability issues at the interface with carbon constrained economies.

I have worked in the areas of economics, agriculture, forestry, water, food, and carbon accounting and modelling research for over 20 years in three different countries and have developed an extensive knowledge and skills in these areas. This is reflected in my research projects, and 90 publications including two books in the last 7 year. Currently, I have been working as the Deputy Director (Operations) at Australian Centre for Sustainable Catchments (ACSC) at USQ. I am also a visiting professor for the Chinese Academy of Sciences (Lanzhou). I am also involved with the IPCC Soil Data Management Group and UN REDD+ Expert Group on Forest Governance Data Collection, I am co-supervising nine PhD students, assessed PhD theses and have been invited to review for a number of years in 11 reputable international journals.

My work has received notable acknowledgment through being awarded numerous high profile national and international awards and grants including: (1) "Senior International Scientist" award from the Chinese Academy of Sciences, 2013; (2) "Climate Change Professional Fellowship" from the US State Department, 2011; (3) "Queensland-China Climate Change Fellowship 2008", jointly awarded by the Queensland and Chinese Governments; (4) US National Sci-

Australian school children's expectations far from economic reality



recent survey has revealed that most Aussie schoolchildren are falling victim to a bitty careers advice system which inflates their expectations only to have them dashed few years later. Spoiled for choice and told by their parents they can be and do anything, new research has revealed a yawning gap between school children's dreams and economic reality.

The National Centre for Vocational Education and Research study of over 2000 kids found while many planned to be lawyers, psychologists, designers and vets at age 15, when interviewed again at 25 the majority ended up sales assistants, primary school teachers and retail managers. An estimated 60 per cent of students would aspire to positions that only 20 per cent attain.

The 10-year study also found aspiring accountants have the firmest grip on reality. Of the 2.9 per cent of 15 year olds who said they wanted to be bean counters, 2.2 per cent ended up fulfilling their dream.

School tests to head online in Victoria

The days of the pen and paper exam could be numbered with the Vic Government developing a new online assessment platform for Victorian schools. The initial work has begun on the new assessment platform that could see any school assessments - including the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) exams - moved online.

This system will be developed to be scaled up in the future to include delivery of current and future assessments to schools, such as the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) .

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development has released a tender for the initial development of the platform, with responses due in early 2014.

The platform will be developed in phases with the initial focus on creating a system that can host existing online assessments, including the English, Mathematics and Health and Physical Education Online Interviews.

This first phase will allow teachers to connect different assessment tools over time, provide a snapshot of how students are progressing, and provide teachers with valuable feedback on how they can contribute to improved student learning."

The system could potentially host all assessments in the future, including VCE, Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL), and Vocational Education and Training (VET) assessments.

Wild West of Nepal: A Pictorial Journey Pictures and text by: Bharat Bandhu Thapa Publisher : Himalayan Map House, 2013

Colleges with foreign affiliation increasing rapidly in Nepal

tudents seeking international degrees had no option but to travel abroad for further studies until domestic educational institutions obtained affiliation from global universities and started providing the same education and degrees in the country.

The trend of establishing colleges with foreign affiliation started in the early 2000s with a tremendous increase in the number of students flying abroad for higher studies. As per the records of the Ministry of Education, there are around 90 academic institutions with international affiliation providing education including A Level courses. Colleges providing bachelors and Master's courses too have increased significantly in the last one decade. Till date, 35 colleges have obtained membership in the International Education Providers Association of Nepal (IEPAN), an umbrella organisation of colleges providing international education at the bachelor's and Master's levels. According to IEPAN, there are around 50 colleges in Nepal that are providing university



education with foreign affiliation from educational institutions in the UK, the US, Switzerland, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore and India.

Globalization in the academic sector has encouraged college operators in the country to run programmes from

globally popular universities. According to college operators, foreign universities keep a close watch on the performance of the colleges to which they have granted affiliation. Officials from these universities visit the colleges twice a year to check the quality of the education being

teachers appointed. The teachers should be competent to deliver the knowledge as demanded by the curricula. Therefore, some of the universities themselves provide training to the teachers. Apart from that, colleges should have the appropriate infrastructure including labs and libraries as specified by the respective universities to get their affiliation.

NRNA registered as Nepalese Banks tax exempt entity in invest Rs 28 billion Nepal



on Resident Nepali Association (NRNA) has been registered as income tax exempt entity as other social or charitable organisations. NRNA President Shesh Ghale had put forth such demand during a meeting with Finance Minister Shankar Prasad Koirala recently, which later got approved by the ministry. He had also underlined the need for taking such decision to encourage the organisa-

Ghale had demanded the government take initiatives with concerned countries to sign double tax avoidance agreement (DTAA) to entice the Non-Resident Nepali investors. He said that NRNs should be included in the list of those honoured for brining in remittance in the country through authorized medium.

The DTAA is essentially bilateral agreements signed between two countries to avoid taxation of income in both the countries or avoiding double taxation of same

"The government should pay attention to bring in foreign investment in Nepal while implementing the concept of special financial sector," read a letter submitted by NRNA to the government.

Minister Koirala noted that government has registered through due procedure in order to promote the investment of NRNs and urged the NRNA president to expand the border of investment. Assuring that the government is ready to create investment friendly environment, the minister urged the NRNs to invest in infrastructure development and energy sector.

MIT to transform the Queen Victoria Market precinct with new investment

RNA President Shesh Ghale, through his company MIT Australia has lodged a planning application for two towers of 50 and 30 storeys with a 210-room hotel and 609 apartments at the corner of William and Franklin streets of Melbourne.

According to the news published by The Age, the proposed 50-storey apartment and hotel development on the front step of Queen Victoria Market could be the first of swag of new highrise towers to overlook the market.

The site is next to land the state government recently transferred to Melbourne City Council as part of plans for a \$250 million redevelopment of the market. The rejuvenation is expected to be partly financed through the council facilitating apartment developments on the edge of the market.

In Nepal, hotels and restaurants have become an attractive option for banks and financial institutions to invest. Bankers state that demand for loans to invest on infrastructure has started to rise due to hope that the tourism industry will gather momentum after the end of armed conflict.

Around Rs 28 billion of loan investment has been made in the sector by mid-October of the current fiscal year along with the rise in number of hotels and restaurants. Commercial banks have invested Rs 20.89 billion, development banks Rs 5.28 billion and finance companies Rs 1.73 billion in the sector, according to the Nepal Rastra Bank (NRB). It was Rs 22.65 billion in the corresponding period of the last fiscal year when commercial banks had invested Rs 16.65 billion, development banks Rs 4.20 billion and finance companies Rs 2.22 billion.

Nepal's first IT Park to open in April

The only Information Technology (IT) Park in the country is coming into operation from mid-April.

The IT Park, situated in Banepa of Kavre district would come into operation soon after the government gives a final touch to the IT Park Operation Procedures, said the Department of IT. The IT Park was completed in 2003/04 with the investment of Rs 270 million.

The government has called the private sector for the IT Park operation immediately after the enforcement of the operation procedures. The government is preparing to give 50 per cent tax subsidy to the park operating companies. On July 17, the government had set up the Department of IT and directed it to prepare and submit the procedures for IT Park operation.

The IT Park was established aiming to develop software, promote IT based business and provide services as well as promote investors in the related fields.

However, Under Secretary at the Ministry of Science Technology and Environment Laxmi Prasad Yadav said that operation of the IT Park was delayed as some companies were reluctant to work citing lack of power supply and fiber installation, narrow road to reach the site and poor internet connectivity. Now, all of these problems have been resolved, paving a way for the operation of the IT Park, officials claim.

Nepal to operate first Special Economic Zone (SEZ) by February

he government of Nepal is all set to start operating its first special economic zone (SEZ) at Bhairahawa by February, 2014.

The construction of this much talked about SEZ had begun 12 years ago. The ministry of industry, which had previously planned to operate the SEZ at Bhairawaha by mid-April this year, could not meet its target after the contractor chosen for the construction failed to complete the task within the agreed time.

The ministry is now busy preparing norms for setting up factories in the SEZ or providing land for interested manufacturing units on lease.

The ministry has also been preparing an Expression of Interest (EoI) to be floated as a formal proposal to ask interested industries to come within the SEZ boundary.

"Once we inaugurate the SEZ, we will promptly float the EoI asking the private sector to come in the SEZ for industrial operation," Yam Kumari Khatiwada, joint secretary at the ministry, told Xinhua.net. A total of 52 plots have been developed for 200 factories in the

Bhairahawa SEZ which is located some 250 km west of Nepal's capital Kathmandu.

The government had first conducted a study to set up an SEZ in 1983. The project was first announced 17 years ago based on China's models.

The industry ministry also said that after looking at the response to the first SEZ it would set up three SEZs in Biratnagar, Panchkhal and Bara by the end of 2014. The ministry is currently holding feasibility studies to establish SEZs in

other places, including Jumla, Kapilvastu, Dhanusha, Siraha, Jhapa, Gorkha and Rautahat. It has already completed a feasibility study in Ratomata and Dhangadhi.

Earlier, in the first week of February this year, the government decided to run the SEZ through a SEZ Development Committee after its attempt to introduce an SEZ Act failed due to the absence of a parliament in the country.

Nepal to become a free WiFi-zone

In an ambitious move, Nepal, sandwiched between IT giants India and China, is planning to turn the country into a free Wi-Fi zone.

A taskforce has been formed to carry out a feasibility study in this regard. The panel, headed by board member of the Nepal Telecommunications Authority Mahesh Prasad Adhikari, has been given 30 days to complete the study, according to the Ministry of Information and Communications.

The panel will suggest the government on funding and technical requirements for the scheme, the report said.

But, Nepal, at the 137th position in the Information and Communication Technology Development Index 2012 brought out by the International Telecommunications Union, the UN agency for global telecommunication standards. the country, still has miles to go.

Despite being located between two fast growing economies — China and India - Nepal has failed to take advantage, the report said.

The northern neighbour, China, dominates the global ICT hardware trade, while the southern neighbour, India, is known for software development and is known as one of the best destinations for business process outsourcing (BPO).
























The school caters for more than 1 000 pupils from 10 surrounding villages



Australia sweeps ashes 5-0



ustralia completed a 5-0 Ashes clean sweep against England as the tourists crumbled to a humiliating 281-run defeat in the fifth Test in Sydney.

Demoralised England capitulated after tea against the home side's pace attack, losing seven wickets in 52 minutes on their way to being bundled out for 166 in 31.4 overs -- getting nowhere near the 448 target for victory.

It was the sixth time the beleaguered tourists had been skittled for under 200 in the series and the crushing defeat is expected to have major ramifications for English cricket just months after they beat Australia 3-0 in England.

Paceman Ryan Harris finished with five for 25 and man-of-the-series Mitchell Johnson -- who took 37 wickets in the five matches -- had figures of 3-40.

Skipper Alastair Cook (7), Ian Bell (16) and Kevin Pietersen (6) all fell in the middle session as England limped to tea on 87-3 but it was carnage after the interval as four wickets tumbled in two overs with the tourists falling apart against inspired Australian bowling and

Michael Carberry (43) feathered Mitchell Johnson to wicketkeeper Brad Haddin just two balls after the resumption and three balls later debutant Gary Ballance was trapped plumb in front by Johnson for seven.

Wicketkeeper Jonny Bairstow was caught close in by George Bailey off spinner Nathan Lyon for a three-ball duck and debutant legspinner Scott Borthwick was magnificently caught by skipper Michael Clarke off Lyon for four.
